**Luke 13:1-9 ESV** 

## Time Is Running Out!!!

Sunday, March 24 – 8:00 & 10:45 Third Sunday in Lent – 2019

Wednesdays of Lent: Services at 11 & 7; Meals at 12 & 6

Introduction: Dear friends in Christ: As Jesus continued to journey toward Jerusalem... to His death, which was for us and our eternal rescue, He had a growing urgency in His teaching – especially about repentance!

- Why is repentance important? Because repentant sinners will be forever blessed, while unrepentant sinners will be forever tormented!
- Who and what are involved in repentance? God the Father, God the Holy Spirit, the Word of God, and a lost sinner.
- What is repentance? It is God the Father working by the Holy Spirit; He works through the Word of God, He shows a person his lost condition, and He gives that person faith to trust in Jesus as His Savior!

Now, let's setup today's sermon text: At the end of Luke chapter 12, Jesus had been talking about interpreting; He said, "When you see a cloud rising in the west, you say at once, 'A shower is coming.' And so it happens" (Lk. 12:54 ESV). Jesus acknowledged their weather-predicting skills! Then He said, "...but why do you not know how to interpret the present time?" (Lk. 12:54 ESV) In other words, I'm here, I'm the Promised Messiah, so as a cloud turns your thoughts to rain, so I should turn your thoughts to repentance! Now, Luke 13...

- 1. REPENT Example Number 1: This first example involves certain Galileans dying at the hands of Pilate's soldiers in a very tragic manner.
  - a. <sup>1</sup> There were some present at that very time who told [Jesus] about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices. // What happened? It was the time of Passover, and Jews from all over had come to Jerusalem; then, when some Galileans were in the temple area slaughtering their lambs for the Passover meal, Pilate murdered those men mixing their blood with the blood of the slain lambs, so tragic indeed! Think today about a terrorist taking refuge in a mosque; because of a holiness-type code, that person is normally safe there until he tries to leave, but Pilate did not follow such a code: (
  - b. <sup>2</sup> And [Jesus] answered them, "Do you think that these Galileans were worse sinners [ἀμαρτωλοί] than all the other Galileans, because they suffered in this way? 3 No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all likewise perish. // What did Jesus do? He did NOT speak of Pilate's sin; that was not the issue. Instead, He said that the amount of a person's sin does not determine the severity of his death – for example, those who died in the twin towers on 9/11 were not exceptionally bad people. And then, getting to the main point, He basically said, "It doesn't matter how you die – whether tragically or by natural causes; instead, what matters is whether or not you repent!" So what is repentance? Dr. Just in the CC put it this way, "Repentance includes sorrow for sin and trust in the one who brings forgiveness and release [namely, Jesus [" (534). Then Jesus basically added, "For all who

DO NOT repent, you will die IN YOUR SINS and be under the sentence of eternal condemnation!"

- 2. REPENT Example Number 2: <sup>4</sup> Or those eighteen on whom the tower in Siloam fell and killed them: do you think that they were worse offenders [debtors Lord's Prayer] than all the others who lived in Jerusalem? <sup>5</sup> No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all likewise perish." // Others told Jesus about the first example; then Jesus went on to reference the second example. The two are similar, but also different: The former example happened by Pilate's action, while this one was an accident.
  - a. <u>The tower in Siloam</u>: It was located in Jerusalem, so those who died when it fell were probably Judeans, rather than Galileans who were looked down upon by the Judeans. Jesus wanted to make it clear that sinners are sinners whether they are Galileans, Judeans, or whoever!
  - b. Tragedy and death: What should come to mind when we hear of such things? Dr. Just, in the CC, wrote that "any such tragedy should be seen not as a sign of God's judgment on specific people for specific sins, but as a sign of his judgment of all people [He also wrote:] The Christian conclusion is not 'they must have deserved it,' but rather, 'I deserved the same'" (535). So Jesus emphasized that repentance is very important for all people!
- 3. God's Work Through His Word: <sup>6</sup> And he told this parable:
  - a. Fruit was expected: "A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard, and he came seeking fruit on it and

- **found none.** // The "seeking" was not just once, but over and over again! And what was he seeking? True repentance!
- b. Time has run out: <sup>7</sup> And he said to the vinedresser, 'Look, for three years now I have come seeking fruit on this fig tree, and I find none. Cut it down. Why should it use up the ground [make it unproductive]?' // God is patient, and during such times He expresses much kindness (Rom 2:4), but His patience has an end!
- c. Give it one more year: <sup>8</sup> And he answered him, 'Sir, let it alone this year also, until I dig around it and put on manure. // God exercises forbearance, which is patient restraint thus one more year. Even though sin deserves immediate condemnation, He gives the unrepentant time to repent (2 Peter 3:9) but eventually that time will run out!
- d. Live or die : Then if it should bear fruit next year, well and good; but if not, you can cut it down." //
  Kenneth Bailey made this comment: "The vinedresser must act to save the tree and at the same time the tree must respond to those acts or they are of no avail" (CC, 536). For example, God wants to work through His Word; however, when people refuse His Word, they are refusing His saving work in their lives!

**This Week's Challenge:** Since time is running out for all who are unrepentant – *not sorry and/or not trusting in Jesus*, how will you reach one such person with God's life-changing Word?
