

Introduction: Dear friends in Christ: Sometimes our lives can be so difficult – that a good outcome seems impossible.
Whenever that is true, let us remember Psalm 40.

This Psalm points to the LORD's help in three ways:

- To David when Saul was seeking to kill him.
- To Jesus when He suffered and died for our salvation.
- To us in our times of great difficulty.

Even though we may be tempted to give up, let us be inspired by David and Jesus! Then, let us trust in the LORD!

I waited patiently for the LORD [that is, God the Father];
 He [the LORD] inclined [stretched, drew near] to me and heard my cry. // As life becomes increasingly difficult, it is normal for us to become increasingly impatient.
 But think about David and Jesus, they waited patiently – confident that the LORD *knew their needs, *heard

their prayers, and →would act at the right time. *Let us do the same!*

- 2. He [the LORD] drew me up from the pit of destruction, out of the miry bog [that is, a muddy clay swamp], and set my feet upon a rock, making my steps secure. // When David was being hunted and Jesus was being flogged, they may have felt like they were trapped in a pit with a muddy clay bottom. But, at the right time, the LORD changed everything from quicksand to solid rock! So, let us keep trusting in the LORD, and never give up!
- 3. He [the LORD] put a new song in my mouth, a song of praise to our God.

Many will see and fear, and put their trust in the LORD. // Since the LORD delivered David from death and raised the body of Jesus to life, they praised the LORD as a testimony to others. Since we know of the powerful work of the LORD in our lives, let us *praise the LORD and *encourage others to trust Him for heaven and everything in this life.

- 4. Blessèd is the man who makes the LORD his trust, who does not turn to the proud, to those who go astray after a lie! // When it comes to trust, we have options: *the LORD God Almighty, *arrogant people who seem to have all the answers, or *false gods. The choice should be simple; let us trust in the Almighty God who →made us, →loves us, →sustains us, and →saved us!
- 5. You have multiplied, O LORD my God, your wondrous deeds and your thoughts toward us; none can compare with you!

I will proclaim and tell of them, yet they are more than can be told. // Try to imagine what the LORD has done for you during your lifetime... Dr. Luther asked: What is meant by daily bread? Then he answered: "Daily bread includes everything that has to do with the support and needs of the body, such as food, drink, clothing, shoes, house, home, land, animals, money, goods, a devout husband or wife, devout children, devout workers, devout and faithful rulers, good government, good weather, peace, health, self-control, good reputation, good friends, faithful neighbors, and the like." So, let us *remember such things, *express our thanks, *live with gratitude, and *tell others about the LORD!

(Regarding verses 6-8, compare with Hebrews 10:5-7.)

6. Sacrifice and offering you have not desired, but you have given me an open ear.

Burnt offering and sin offering you have not required.

// Why did the LORD command people to sacrifice? To touch their hearts, to get them *thinking about their sins, *having godly sorrow, and *trusting in the coming Messiah. David was a man after the LORD's own heart (1 Samuel 13:14) and Jesus is the sinless Son of God, so the LORD heard their prayers. What about us? "The LORD is far from the wicked [unrepentant], But He hears the prayer of the righteous [repentant]" (Prov. 15:29).

7. Then I said, "Behold, I have come; in the scroll of the book it is written of me: // Those words should draw us right to Jesus: He willingly came to *fulfill the law for us and *bear our sins; He fulfilled hundreds of OT prophecies!

- 8. I desire to do your will, O my God; your law is within my heart." // Again, we focus on Jesus: His desire to do God's will was perfect, He did not back down, even when facing the excruciating †pain, †agony, and †torment of death on a cross!
- 9. I have told the glad news of deliverance in the great congregation [God's people gathered at the tabernacle, temple]; behold, I have not restrained my lips, as you know, O LORD. // Since, through Jesus, the LORD has *snatched us from hell and *gifted us with heaven, how are we making that known? As we live in this fallen world, all believers are being called to speak and live in ways that *honor the LORD and *point others to repent and receive God's forgiveness.
- 10. I have not hidden your deliverance within my heart; I have spoken of your faithfulness and your salvation; I have not concealed your steadfast love and your faithfulness from the great congregation. // Since the LORD is being SO GOOD TO US, let us openly, boldly, and lovingly tell of His *deliverance, *faithfulness, *salvation, and *steadfast love!
- 11. As for you, O LORD, you will not restrain your mercy from me;

your steadfast love and your faithfulness will ever preserve me! // The LORD's mercy is when He holds back the punishment we deserve now and forever!

Let Us Pray: Dear LORD, we are in awe of Your incredible goodness to us poor sinners. Help us to make You known!
